“Never Offend”

²¹ *It is* good neither to eat meat nor drink wine nor *do anything* by which your brother stumbles or is offended or is made weak. ²² Do you have faith? Have *it* to yourself before God. Happy *is* he who does not condemn himself in what he approves.

Verse 21 is indeed a blessed verse in that it is a beautiful thing neither to eat or drink or do anything that might offend your brother or cause him to stumble or be made weak. You may have a right to all these things, but as a Christian you voluntarily forego the thing.

Paul closes now by talking to both parties: first to the strong in verse 22. Are you proud that you know the liberty that is in Christ, as we have been teaching here? Don't display how much you can do and how far you can go because of your faith. Lay your faith before God and not before other people. Suppose you could go to the theatre and prove that you have faith strong enough. Do not display it. You may allow things in your life because you are free, but there is a danger that you may upset another's faith.
